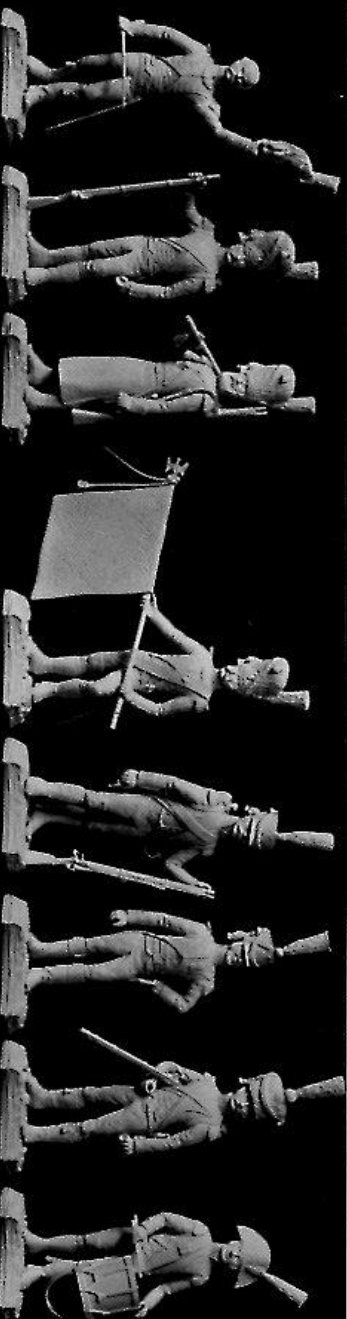

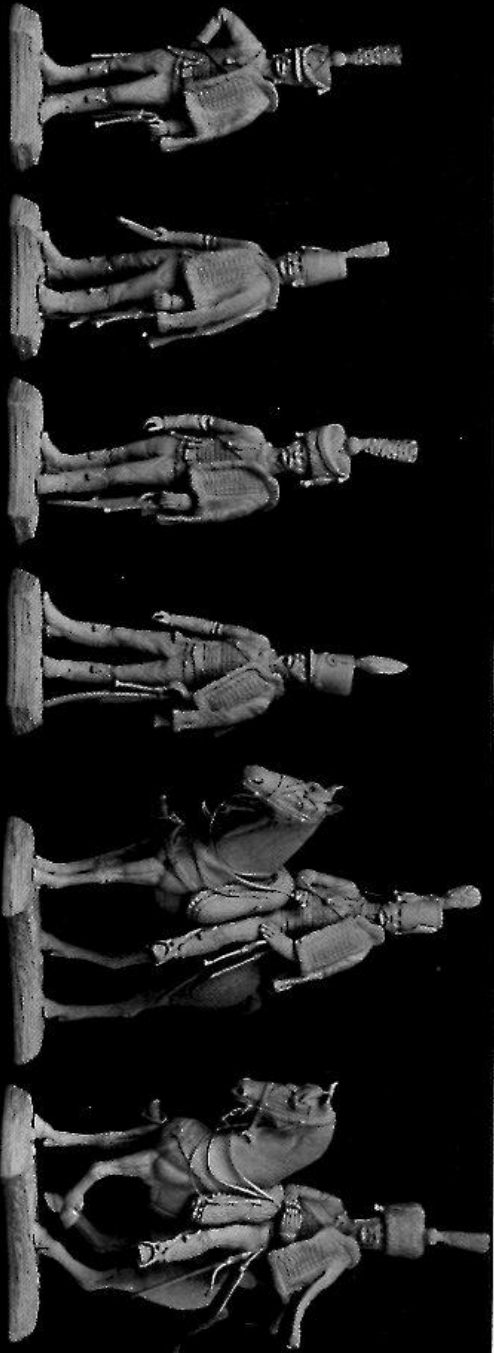

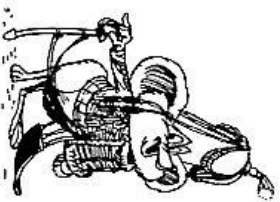
We depict these Hussars in the various headgear worn from the French Revolution to Waterloo.

In stage three we present the light horse lancers of both the guard and the line.

When Napoleon entered Warsaw, he was escorted by soldiers of that city armed with the lance. He was so impressed with it, he created a regiment of Polish lancers for his guard. Later, when its efficiency had been proven, six regiments of dragoons were converted into lancers, as well as a regiment of Dutch hussars, who were added to the Imperial guard as the famous "Red Lancers".

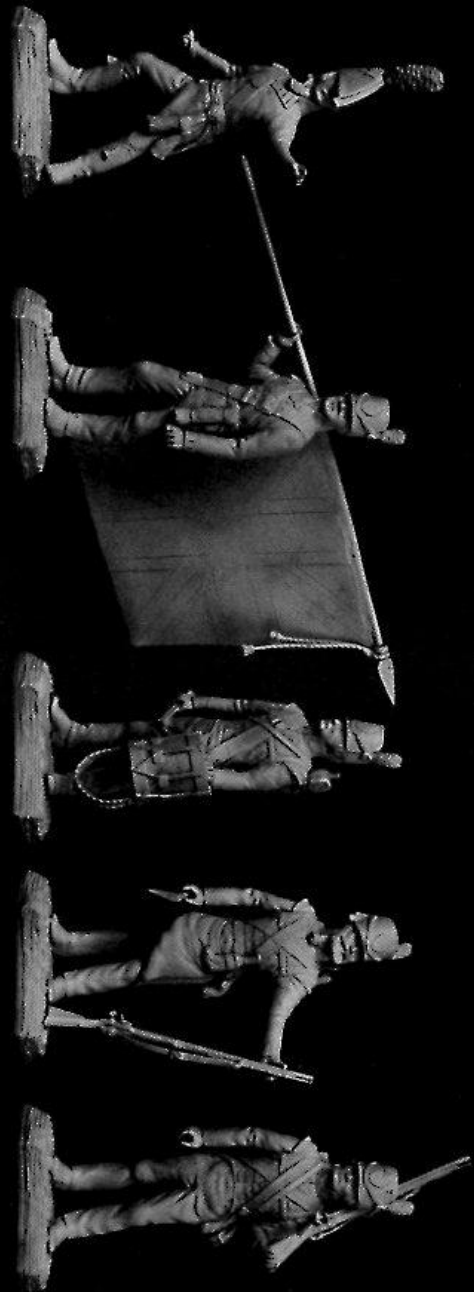

Three columns set out and a pitched battle was fought at the village of Botache on the South Saskatchewan River. The insurgents were beaten and the remnants pursued to Loon Lake where another battle was fought. This ended the rebellion, and in November, 1885, Louis Riel and six Indian supporters were hanged. This was the first campaign in the history of the Canadian Forces to be fought without the backing of the regular British Troops.

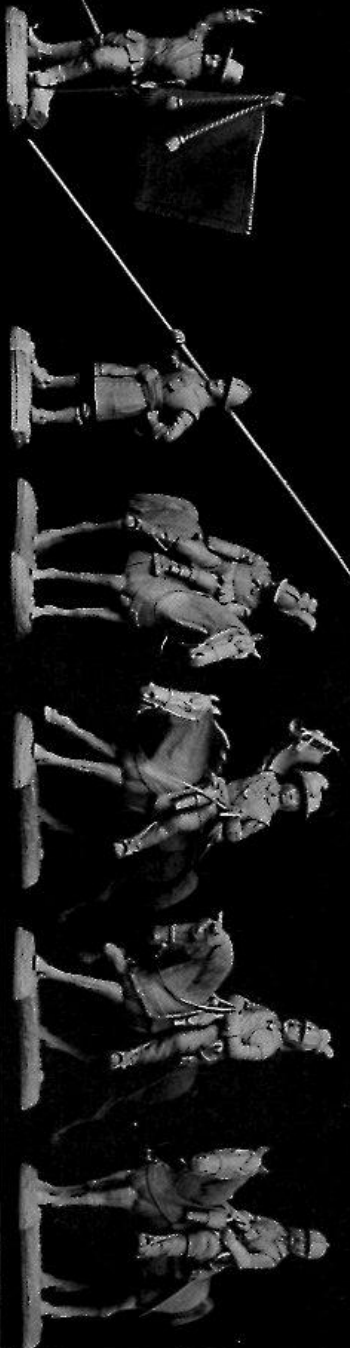
With stage ten, we present the soldiers and leaders of the English Civil War. A time when the fates of nations and kings was decided "at push of pike".

As the concept of uniformity was still rudimentary at this time, most armies tended to look alike and be similarly equipped. These figures are suitable for any of the armies of the 30 years war.

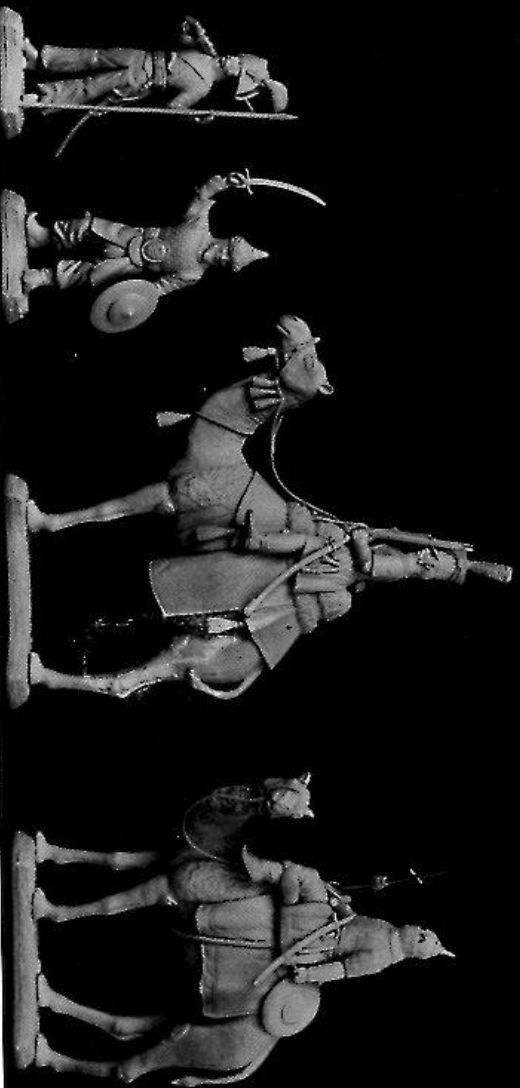

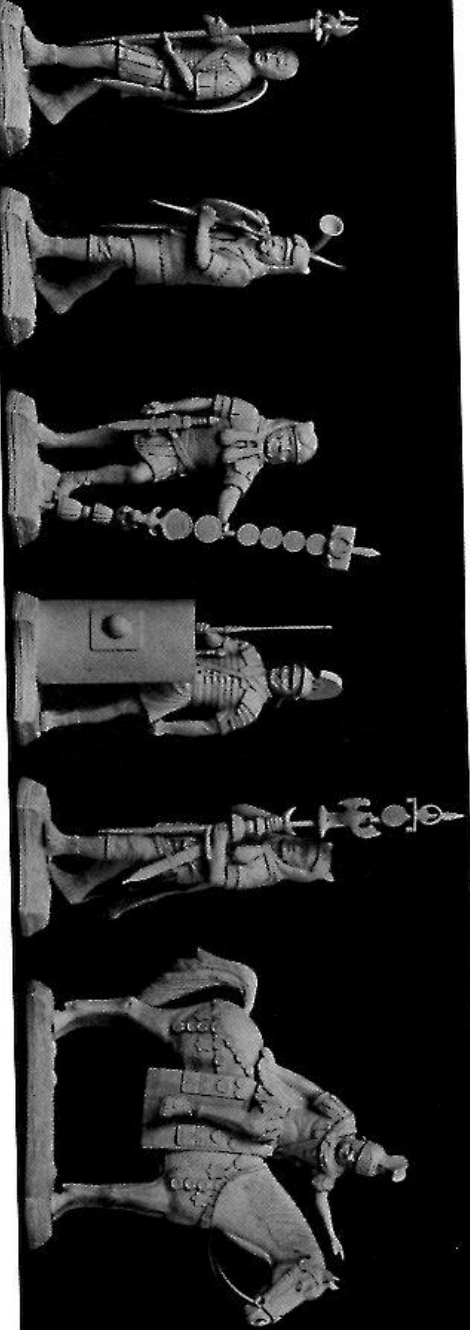

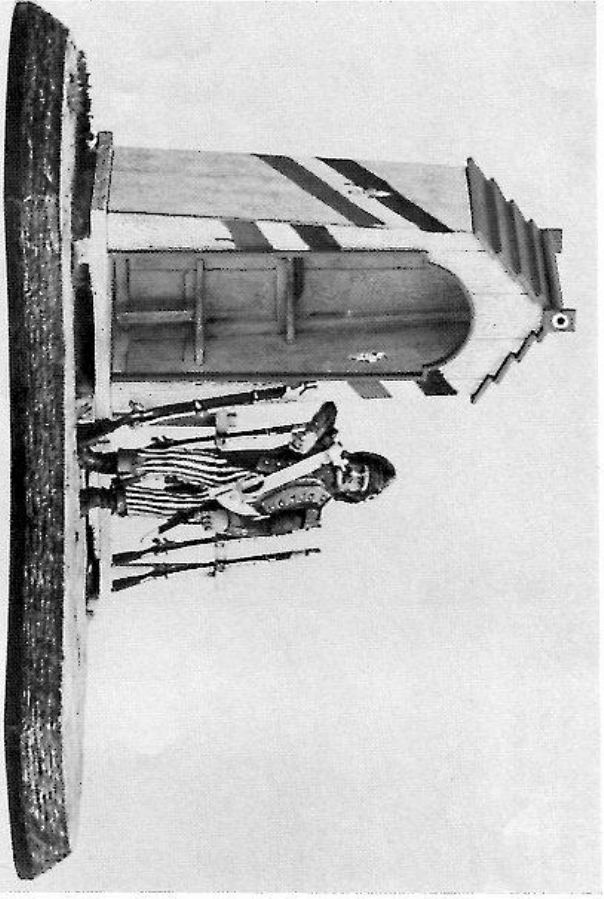
The Vignette, a small assemblage of these 7mm figures and equipment has long been a favorite means of capturing a dramatic moment, or, the subtle feel of ages past.

V/1 "AND SO ON THE ROAD FROM ROME." Here we pair a victorious Roman Legionary with a supine Gaul Standard Bearer.

The drama of the moment is enhanced by the contrast offered between the barbaric finery of the Gallic noble, and the sombre, functional cold weather uniform of the Legionary.



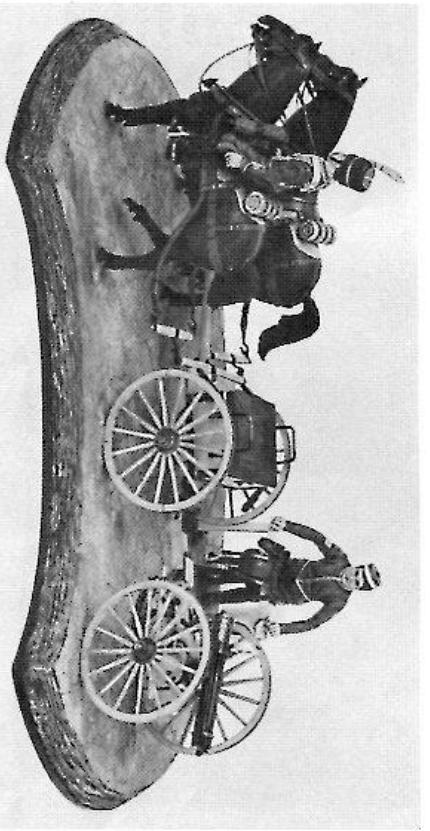
V/2 "AND ALL FOR THE KINGS SHILLING" The care of the wounded, a subject conspicuous by its absence from most histories of great campaigns, is treated in this poignant vignette. A wounded British soldier borne on the back of his wife, while his son, carrying his musket, trudges dutifully beside him.



V/3 "DAWN OF A NEW AGE"
In the life of any soldier, hopalite or paratrooper, the more onerous tasks such as guard duty occupy far more of his time than do parades or combat.

In this vignette, we capture the peace, tranquility and down right boredom of a veteran left to ponder, for hours, why he must guard a road no one in his right mind would want anyway!

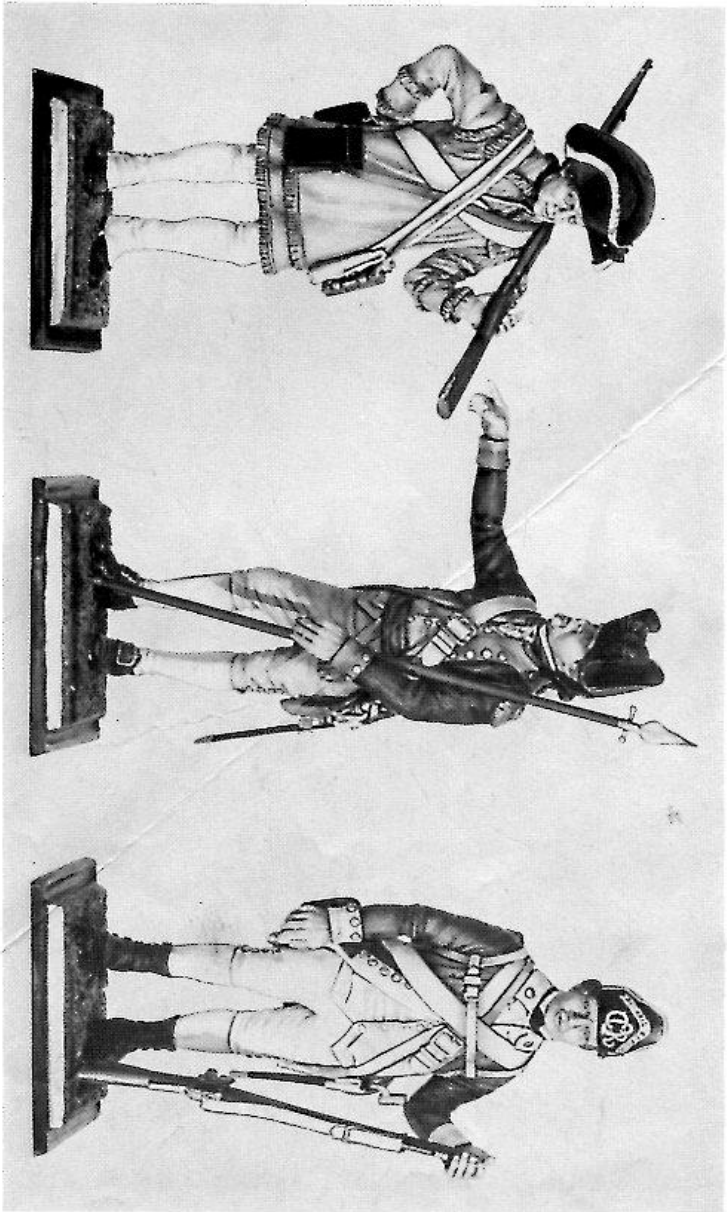
V/4 "THE IMPROVED GATLING BATTERY"

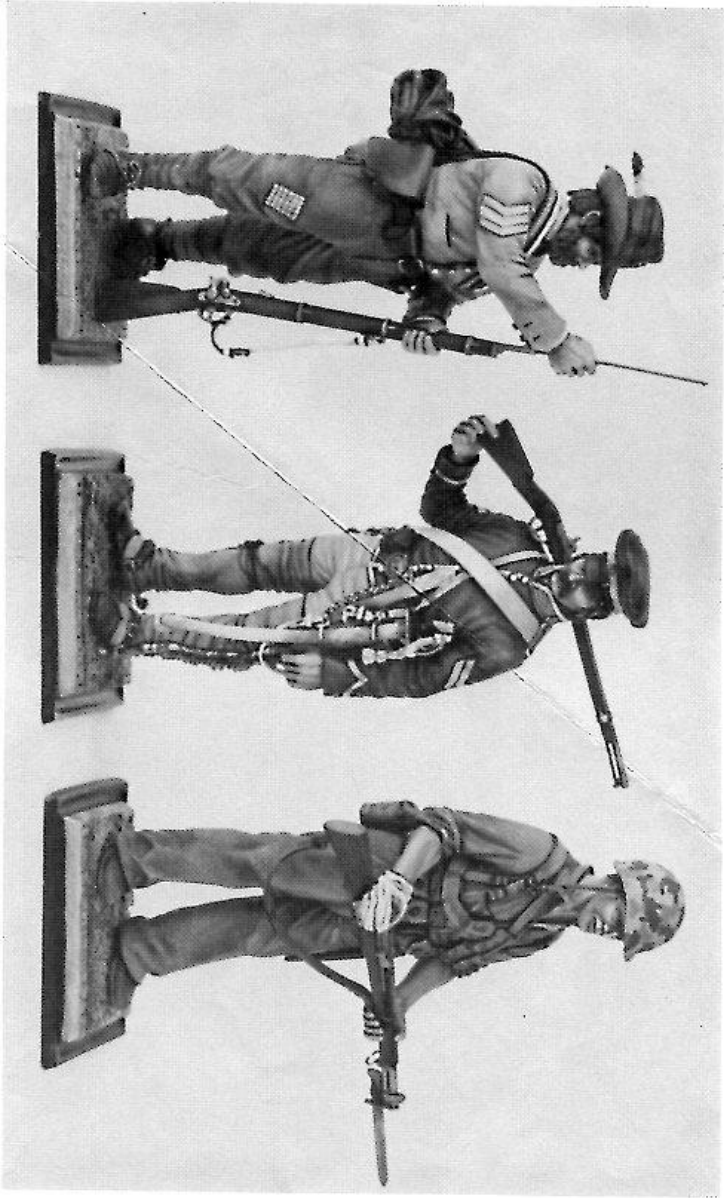

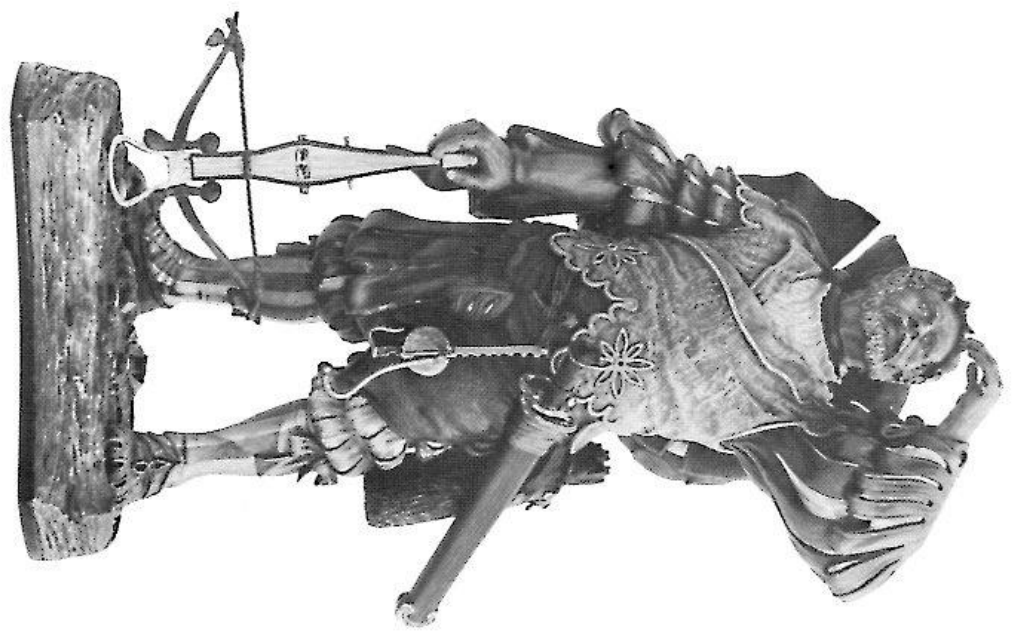

For our first offering, we have chosen one of the most colorful subjects offered by military history, the Landsknecht.

Although each kit comes provided with a comprehensive painting guide, this finely detailed sculpture of thirty-six parts allows you a wide range of your own individual color schemes.

The garish dress of these soldiers made them so noticeable, in fact, that the Emperor Maximilian was petitioned by his nobles to deny the Landsknecht the right to dress in this manner. He refused, claiming the poor Landsknecht deserved one luxury in his miserable life!



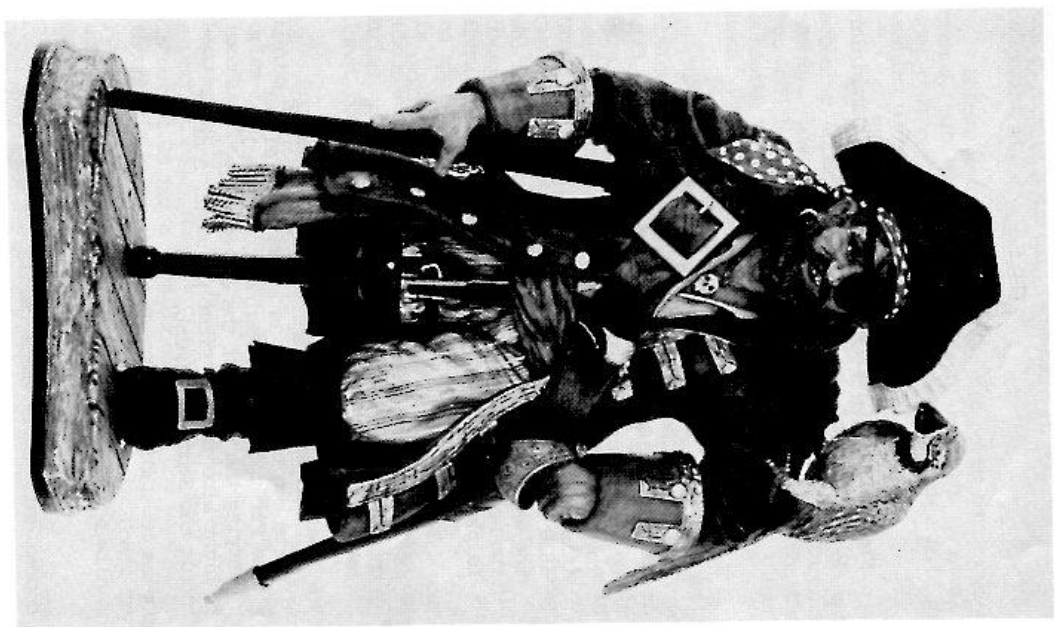

From the pistol through his sash, to the parrot on his shoulder, this sculpture would grace the collection of anyone who loves the romance of the sea.

French Heavy Cavalryman, "Officer of Carabiniers:
at the time of the Napoleonic wars.

Due to the heavy casualties suffered by the Carabiniers in 1809, Napoleon decided to armor these elite cavalrymen. Although this was not popular with the Carabiniers, 1810 saw them shedding their blue coats for the white coat and cuirass that was to mark them on the battlefields of Borodino, Leipzig and Waterloo.

With this kit we depict a senior officer of Carabiniers, wearing the distinctive copper cuirass and helmet dictated by his rank.

This kit, consisting of twenty-three parts can be painted as a member of either the First or Second Regiment, by simply varying the color of the exposed cuff. Light blue for the First Regiment, scarlet for the Second Regiment.
